This term the focus in theme has been travel and how it has changed. car. In maths they have been doing

lots of weighing, measuring and capacity. They has also been a focus on Belonging and they have been finding out what happens during Mothering Sunday, Shabbat, Aqiqah and Easter. This half-term has flown by! We began the half-term at The Curve Theatre watching the fantastic performance of Room on the Broom by Julia Donaldson. In class, we have enjoyed learning about maps; locating and comparing physical and human features on a map of Newtown Linford and



Leicester. In science we have been learning about plants; identifying the names and functions of the parts of plants. Our art also linked to this, as we learnt some sketching skills, creating an



observational drawing of a plant. In maths we have been learning about weight, mass and volume and how we measure these. In English we have really enjoyed reading The Pirate's Next Door. We have also written our own adventure story... the sequel to The Snail and The Whale by Julia Donaldson and shared these with Linford Class. Have a lovely Easter break (don't forget there are lots of tasks to complete on MyMaths, and keep up with your reading !)







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Tyburn Class

Tyburn have had a fantastic half term filled with lots of wonderful experiences. Earlier this term we visited Thinktank Museum and the children had a fun filled, educational day and took part in lots of scientific experiments and closely observed the science around them. This led us to the topic focus this term, Blue Planet. We have examined the impact of climate change and how can we make a difference. Through DT and Art children have created wonderful sculptures from recycled materials and wrote a persuasive letter to put together all of our great writing features.





Year 3 and 4 have worked really hard in maths, converting fractions or measures and it has been amazing to see every single one of us trying to get onto the going deeper. We have challenged ourselves and worked really hard. We are pleased with how well all the children are progressing. Best of luck for summer term!

Old John Class

In Old John, we've had a great end to our second Spring term! We've written a persuasive letter about deforestation to the United Nations, an instructional text with our own Bear Grylls style rainforest survival guide, and our own narrative based off the short film 'Ride of Passage'. We've developed our understanding of all sorts of persuasive devices, complex sentences, adverbials and the features of a letter and instructional text, such as bullet-points, sub-headings and formality. In our Maths, we've been developing our understanding of



percentages, algebra and angles, which has really been testing our noggins! Luckily, the class has all been really applying themselves in Maths, especially when it comes to our explanations and reasoning.

In our Theme lessons, we've been learning about the history of the rainforest, why tigers are entering into cities



an d leaving their habitats, and how a rainforest is structured. In our Science, we've learnt materials – doing experiments to compare thermal conductivity, observing how solutions can be separated with Diet Coke and Mentos, and thought about reversible and irreversible changes with bicarbonate of soda and white vinegar.

Creatively, we've also been sketching parts of the school, using local

artwork to inspire and sketch, thinking about perspective and how we can represent objects proportionally to others.

Our **biggest** achievement is reading nearly 2,000,000 words as a class in total over 5 weeks! This is a phenomenal

achievement and I'm so proud of everybody for quizzing and working so hard on their reading all term. Well done to **The Beasts** and commiserations for the **Ratatouilles!**

basketball training with coaches from the Leicester Riders next term. This will be on **Thursdays** and **Old John** and **Tyburn** will need to come in PE Kit.

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
Reading Fluency

This year we have been learning about the process of learning to read. There has been much new research, particularly on phonics, on how we all read.

It is now evident that we use our phonics much more than we realise. When we are fluent readers what we are doing is decoding and blending extremely quickly, so fast we do not notice. This is named 'automatic blending'.

In order to reach this level of competency we must first become familiar with all the phonic sounds. Then how to decode and blend these. Eventually, by practicing this thousands of times we are able to do this fluently, 'automatic blending'. This will take different lengths of time for different children. This is also why we ask your children to read the same book lots of times. They are learning to decode fluently through doing this.

Eventually, they will become fluent in the phase they are in and the process begins again with the new phase.




Bucket Book
