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Class Updates

Linford Class

We have had another wonderful half-term in Linford Class. Our topic was all about 'People Who Help Us', including a

visit to school from a nurse and some fire fighters. We asked them lots of questions about their

job and role-played these professions in the classroom. In English, we wrote facts about a nurse from the past (Florence Nightingale) and we enjoyed describing the characters in the fiction text 'Zog and the Flying Doctors'. EYFS sequenced and retold the story and Year 1 did a fantastic job of writing the story using the conjunction 'and' to join their ideas.

In DT the children chose a character from a story about people who help us and have created a puppet (year 1) or a collage (EYFS) of this character. They thought carefully about the materials they will use and how they will join them.

In Science we have been learning about different types of materials, and in RE we have been learning about different religions, with EYFS focusing on Christianity and Year 1 focusing on Islam. Mrs Ismail very kindly bought in some Muslim artefacts for Year 1 to learn about and talked about why these are special to Muslims. Have a lovely break! From the Linford Team



Bradgate Class

This term has been filled with lots of learning and exploration here in Bradgate. We've had the chance to dive into exciting topics and activities, and we can't wait to share what we've been up to!

Our theme this term was "How did a nurse become famous?" We kicked off the unit by exploring the life of Florence Nightingale. The children learned about her incredible contributions to nursing and healthcare. We then compared Florence's work to modern-day nursing and were very lucky to have a special visit from Nurse Sue. The children had the opportunity to ask questions, explore nursing tools and equipment, and engage in hands-on activities with their peers. After the visit, they wrote recounts to reflect on what they had learned from Nurse Sue.



In music, we've been learning about pitch and tempo. The children created their own mini patterns using three high and low notes, either to invent a superhero name or build on one from a previous lesson. They enjoyed singing and playing along with their melodies, developing both their creativity and musical skills.



In maths, we have been working on division, focusing on the concept of grouping equally. Through various hands-on activities, the children learned how to divide into equal groups and visually understand the division process.

Bradgate students have worked incredibly hard this term, and we're so proud of all the progress they've made. We look forward to another exciting term ahead!

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Class Updates

Tyburn Class

We have had another lovely half term in Tyburn Class. This term, our topic has been the Anglo Saxons. The children have thoroughly enjoyed learning about settlements, the discovery at Sutton Hoo and how the Anglo Saxons influenced the name 'Newtown Linford'.

The children have worked particularly hard in English this term, they have produced some fantastic 'defeating the monster' narratives and some very interesting non-chronological reports. This week, we have been writing letters from an Anglo Saxon child's point of view, I have been so impressed with the children's use of exclamation sentences and conjunctions.

In maths, we have been working on length and perimeter. The children have been challenged to find equivalent lengths in millimetres, centimetres and metres! We have also been working really hard on our times tables.

Finally, the children have had an absolutely fantastic time at Forest School this term. It has been wonderful to take learning out of the classroom and to see our children flourish.

Happy new year to all of our parents! This term, our theme has been all around the mysterious civilisation of the Maya. We've spent our time learning about the Maya, their culture, the modern day legacy of their people and how archaeologists and historians navigate the tricky situation of understanding the past with so little evidence. The children have really responded to this topic which has been great to see.

In our English, Old John have written a set of instructions to travel to Guatemala (they were all particularly enchanted by the giant bronze hand at Hobbitenango) and have written a 'Time Slip' narrative where their characters get transported back to the time of the Maya! They have worked hard on including and perfecting their use of dialogue this term and it has gotten better and better every time.

In Maths, we have been working on percentages, area and perimeter. We're making great progress in this area so far and will continue our work after the half term.
