

Wow, we can't believe how quickly this year has gone! We couldn't be more proud of the progress all of the children in Linford Class have made, both personally and academically. We have thoroughly





We enjoyed learning about 'Punch and Judy' puppet shows and role-played our own shows to each other too.



The children have been as creative as always; Year 1 created beach scenes inspired by Edgar Degas' artwork, and EYFS have made seaside collages and paintings, selecting and mixing colours for a purpose. In our 'plants' topic, we wrote instructions about how to plant a seed and then we planted some sunflower seeds of our own to take home and look after.

What a busy and brilliant end to the school year! The children have worked incredibly hard, fitting so much learning into such a short space of time.

In history and literacy, we explored the theme of holidays – comparing our own experiences with what holidays might have been like in the past. The children wrote thoughtful letters to parents or grandparents to enquire about holidays in the past. In art, we took inspiration from Edgar Degas, focusing on his beach scenes. The children explored how Degas built up layers of paint to create texture and used similar techniques to produce their own layered seaside artwork.

This term we investigated the properties of materials, with a hands-on challenge to design and build boats using the most suitable materials – followed, of course, by some exciting testing! Our topic on plants saw us start to think about what healthy plants need to thrive – a timely reminder, as our classroom plants are definitely ready for some summer TLC.

Children have enjoyed spending time reading and learning outdoors. They have had a phenomenal time at the Year 2 sleepover. All behaved beautifully an d independent. They listened to all their instructions and had a great time!
